To the Members of the 142nd Synod of the Diocese of Niagara:

If this is your first Synod, we welcome you and hope that you will be enriched by this experience of the wider church. The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Niagara is the legal entity (established by statute of the Legislature in the Province of Ontario) with responsibility for the dealings of the Anglican Church within its diocesan boundaries. At Synod we seek God's intention for us as we pray, discern, talk, listen and work at being a Church as a diverse community under the leadership of our Bishop, the Right Reverend Michael A. Bird.

This session of Synod will convene promptly on **Saturday November 5th at 9:00 am**, with registration in Myler Hall beginning at 8:00 am; this is where you will there you will receive your nametags, voting cards, etc. Lunch will be catered by Jonny Blonde, one of our Hamilton food trucks; the cost of this will be included in your parish invoice for Synod delegate fees later in November.

The theme of Synod this year is 'Baskets Overflowing'. We ask all delegates to please bring nutritious non-perishable food items that will be collected during Synod as an expression of our abundance together. These donations will then be disbursed to local foodbanks within your region of our Diocese.

This year marks a change in the process for the nomination and election of Regional Representatives to Synod Council. For further information, please refer to the Synod webpage http://niagaraanglican.ca/synod/2016/ or contact your local archdeacon. Three regions will have their regional caucus from 12:00-12:30 pm in designated breakaway spaces and the other three regions will have their caucus from 1:00-1:30 pm in the breakaway rooms. More detailed information will be available at registration.

Attached to this package is a map showing City of Hamilton parking lots to enable you to park close to the Cathedral.

All motions and other important information at Synod will be presented on a large central screen so you may choose not to print the circular. If you wish to print portions of the information provided online and do not have a printer, please contact your parish for assistance.

The layout of Synod will be slightly different in compliance with the Fire Code for the space within the Cathedral; straight tables will be set up down the length of the nave of the Cathedral.

The Cathedral is a Wi-Fi enabled facility which will facilitate delegates accessing Synod-related documents on wireless devices. This year we are increasing our bandwidth to

accodomodate the number of devices requiring wireless connectivity during Synod. It will also enable us to share the work of Synod widely through our Facebook page (Anglican Diocese of Niagara) and Twitter feed (@niagaraanglican). If you are using Twitter, please use #synodniagara as the hashtag for Synod-related posts. We ask that clergy ensure that should a delegate from their parish not have access to email, they distribute all relevant information that has been distributed to clergy and lay delegates via email.

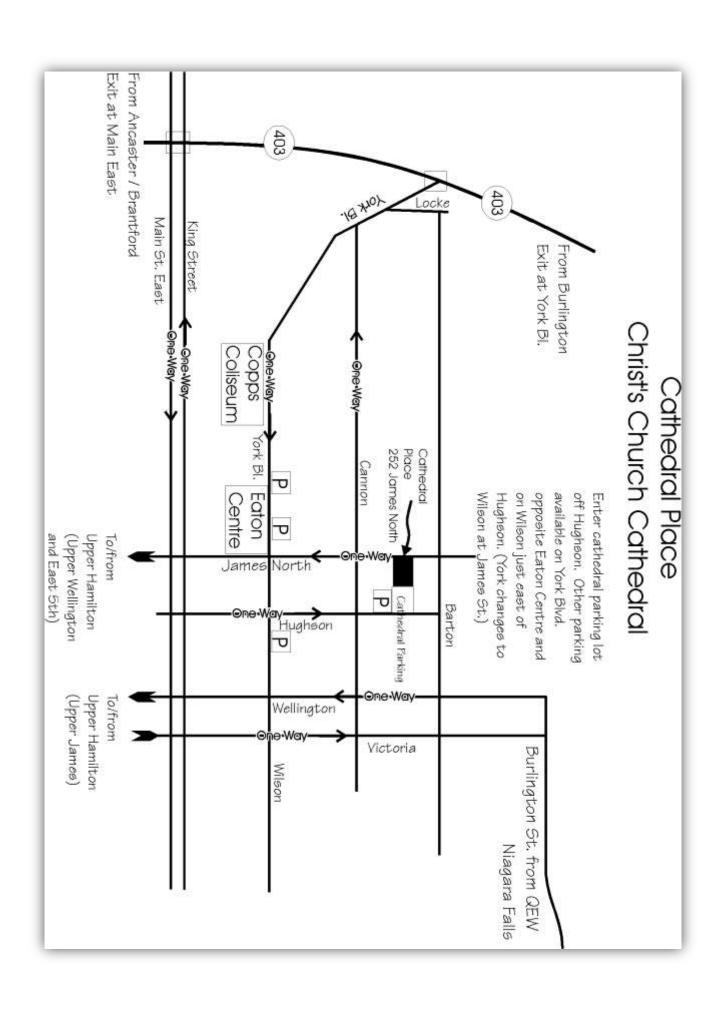

- 7. State your thoughts as clearly as possible supporting your argument with fact or thought.
- 8. Finish with a thank you and return to your seat.
- 9. You make speak only once to each motion.

No person shall be eligible for election to a General or Provincial Synod if that election would result in that person serving a fourth consecutive term as delegate at such Synod, provided that this section shall not apply to any person who holds office as Prolocutor or Deputy Prolocutor of either General Synod or Provincial Synod or Vice-Chancellor of General Synod.'

Minutes of the Second Session of the 141st Synod of the Diocese of Niagara October 30 and 31, 2015 at Christ's Church Cathedral in Hamilton

The Right Reverend Michael Bird, Bishop of Niagara, called the Second Session of the 141st Synod of the Diocese of Niagara to order at 9:02 a.m. The Bishop announced that the offering received would go towards supporting the diocesan refugee fund.

Gathering Worship: Bishop's Charge & Eucharist

The Holy Eucharist was celebrated by the Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz. During his charge to synod, Bishop Bird discussed the theme of this synod, "More Together." Bishop Bird spoke to the "dawning of a new tomorrow": (1) in which we are becoming discipleship-based rather than membership-based; (2) where our participation in God's mission cannot be separated from our life together; and (3) where we participate not in separate acts of outreach, but a network of loving concern.

The Bishop also recognized Canon Robert Welch as having served 25 years as Chancellor and commented that Canon Welch's father had also acted as Chancellor for 25 years.

Clicker Orientation

A representative from Data on Spot gave an orientation to the clicker technology. It was fun to get comfortable voting with these devices by answering a few sample questions.

Report of the Credentials Committee

Canon Robert Welch reported that as of 8:55 am on October 30, 90% of all eligible delegates in the Order of the Clergy and 66% of the Order of the Laity had registered. He declared that there was a quorum.

CARRIED.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Reverend Canon Rob Hurkmans made an announcement regarding the ReChurch Conference with the theme of "Let's Grow" in partnership between the Diocese of Niagara and Wycliffe College. The speaker is The Very Reverend Kevin Martin, retired Dean of the Diocese of Dallas. The Venerable Max Wooaover spoke to the import of this conference for St. Andrew's Grimsby.

The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell made some housekeeping announcements.

<u>Introduction of Lisa Di Veto, Stewardship, Legacy Giving and Fund Development</u> <u>Consultant</u>

Bishop Michael Bird introduced Lisa Di Veto, Stewardship, Legacy Giving and Fund Development Consultant. Lisa made a brief presentation where she described a number of new initiatives, including: (1) The Leadership Meeting; (2) Grants; (3) Legacy Giving Workshop.

Bishop Bird acknowledged the generous support of the National Church for many years in this area of diocesan stewardship development and thanked the Primate for this support.

Cathedral Place Revitalization Project Update

Dean Peter Wall reported on the status of this project, which remains in preliminary stages, with important work of consultation and development of the plan ongoing. The letter of intent is ready to be signed between the diocese and the developer.

Provincial Synod Report

A reporting team from the delegates to Provincial Synod, including Sue Carson, Canon David Ricketts, and Sierra Robertson-Roper made a presentation on the 3 day session earlier in October.

Marriage Canon: Presentation & Discussion

Archbishop Fred Hiltz made a presentation regarding the work of the Commission on the Marriage Canon, and where we as a church now find ourselves in this conversation. Any change in the canon requires a conscience clause, amendments and clarification.

Following the presentation there was a moderated session led by the Dean including questions for clarification, and reflections from the floor.

The Bishop asked and charged all parishes and Synod Council to study this report and called for the formation of a commission to receive reports and to report back to the Diocesan Synod next year regarding any response required by this synod following General Synod 2016.

LUNCH

A character actor playing the role of Bishop Fuller, first Bishop of Niagara said the Grace. A video called The Church in the Public Square was played and delegates had time to meet with the General Synod nominees during the lunch break.

Synod Council Report

MOTION: The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell/ Mr. Terry Charters 'THAT the Synod Council Report, having been fully considered, be now finally approved, and that all the decisions, agreements and documents entered into and signed on Synod's behalf since the last session of Synod, be hereby ratified and confirmed.'

CARRIED.

Election of 2016 - 2017 Synod Council Members

MOTION: The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell/Canon Robert Welch 'THAT this Synod elect the regional members of Synod Council and alternate regional members for the 2016 - 2017 term, as outlined on the nominations sheet, as outlined on the nomination sheet distributed at registration.'

CARRIED.

<u>Proposal for Electing Synod Council Regional Representatives</u>

The Reverend Bill Mous spoke to a proposal for a new way of electing Synod Council Regional Representatives. The Governance Working Group had met and considered how to enhance representation of Synod on Synod Council, how to standardize the process of electing regional representatives and how to increase the accountability of those elected. This is part of our ongoing process of governance review. Synod Council will review feedback from this meeting of Synod. Comments and questions were received.

<u>Canterbury Hills Endowment Fund</u>

Canon Christyn Perkons and Jodi Beck reported. Canon Perkons reviewed the history of the sale of portions of the Canterbury Hills property. Jodi Beck explained the numbers concerning the proceeds of sale, expenses, debt and the balance which is being considered for investment.

MOTION: Canon Christyn Perkons/ Terry Charters

'WHEREAS the property known as Canterbury Hills Camp and Conference Centre is owned by the Diocese of Niagara and is leased by the Canterbury Hills Board of Directors for \$1 per year for its use; and

WHEREAS the Canterbury Hills property was divided into three parcels, two of which were subsequently sold resulting in a net amount of \$1,154,505 being received by the Diocese;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Synod authorize the Treasurer to disburse the net proceeds of the

sale of the two parts of the Canterbury Hills property as follows:

- a) to fully reimburse the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara in the amount of \$630,032 for the indebtedness of the Canterbury Hills Camp and Conference Centre it previously assumed;
- b) to establish an internally restricted fund held by the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara in the amount of \$524,473, for the purposes of supporting program and capital costs associated with ministry undertaken by the Canterbury Hills Camp and Conference Centre Board;

AND THAT only 80% of the growth in the value of the aforementioned internally restricted fund may be drawn in any given year such that in years of negative growth, funds may still be drawn provided the initial value of the fund remains intact.

AND THAT all monies in the aforementioned internally restricted fund be redirected to the Disestablished Properties Fund should the Canterbury Hills Conference Centre Board no longer require financial support.'

CARRIED.

Revised License Agreement

The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell made a brief presentation. One of the changes in this new agreement raises the amount of liability insurance required by the licensee to \$2 million.

MOTION: The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell/ Canon David Ricketts 'THAT the revised parish license agreement be adopted effective November 1, 2015.'

CARRIED.

<u>Reflection Time & Prayer Stations</u>

The Reverend Michael Deed introduced a time of reflection and prayer. Sheets were placed at each table with questions for reflection; stations included icons and placards.

Canonical Changes

The votes for all of the changes to the canons were taken by house.

Replacement of Canon 3.5: College of Deacons

MOTION: The Reverend Deacon Rod McDowell/ Ms. Sue Carson '**THAT** Canon 3.5 be replaced as follows:

- 1. There shall be a College of Deacons whose purpose is to provide communal support and encouragement to deacons exercising their ministries throughout the Diocese of Niagara.
- 2. The diocesan Bishop shall appoint a Director of Deacons and may appoint both a Deputy Director of Deacons and a Chaplain to the College of Deacons. The Director and Deputy Director, if any, shall serve at the Bishop's pleasure and assist the Bishop in the placement and supervision of deacons. The Bishop's Chaplain to the College will function as a pastor to the deacons on behalf of the Bishop.
- 3. The College of Deacons shall be composed of:
 - (a) all deacons in good standing and holding a Bishop's Permission
 - (b) the Director of Deacons:
 - (c) the Deputy Director of Deacons, if any; and
 - (d) the Bishop's Chaplain to the College of Deacons, if any.
- 4. There shall be an Executive Council of the College of Deacons whose purpose is to advise and assist the Bishop, Director of Deacons and Deputy Director of Deacons, if any, in seeking and promoting the vitality of diaconal ministries in the Diocese of Niagara.
- 5. The Executive Council of the College of Deacons shall be composed of:
 - (a) the Director of Deacons, who shall serve as Chair;
 - (b) the Deputy Director of Deacons, if any;
 - (c) three delegates duly elected from the membership of the College of Deacons;
 - (d) the Bishop's Chaplain to the College of Deacons, if any; and
 - (e) the Bishop or his/her designate.

CARRIED.

<u>Amendment of Canon 1.1: Composition of Synod</u>

MOTION: Canon Robert Welch/ The Reverend Deacon Jean Ruttan-Yates 'THAT Canon 1.1 be revised as follows:

- 1. The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara shall consist of:
 - (1) The Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the head of Synod;
 - (2) Any Suffragan or Coadjutor Bishop thereof;
 - (3) The Priests, Deacons and Lay Workers thereof, duly licensed; (amended, 2015)
 - (4) The Director of Deacons, the Deputy Director of Deacons (if any), and up to

three deacons (who have been granted a Bishop's Permission) elected annually

by the College of Deacons from among its members, (amended 2015)

- (5) The Chancellor;
- (6) The Vice-Chancellor, if any;
- (7) The Treasurer;
- (8) The Secretary of Synod; (amended, 1991)
- (9) The Lay Representatives duly elected in accordance with Canon 4.1(17);
- (10) Anyone not otherwise designated above who is a member of the Synod Council; (new, 2001)
- (11) Not more than 10 Lay Representatives who shall be appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese in each year in consultation with the Synod Council, such Lay Representative serving for a one-year term.
- 2. Lay Workers who are members of Synod shall be considered members of the Order of Laity for purposes of voting.
- 3. Clergy who receive a pension from the Anglican Church of Canada and who are currently in good standing with the Bishop of Niagara shall be entitled to a seat on the floor of the Synod, and shall have a right to take part in discussion, but shall not be entitled to vote. (amended,2015)

CARRIED.

Canon 4.8: Cemeteries

MOTION: Canon Rob Welch/ The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell '**THAT Canon 4.8 be enacted as presented.**'

1. Every parish of the Diocese with a cemetery, scattering garden or columbarium (here after referred to in this Canon as a cemetery) adjacent to or affiliated with such parish shall have a Cemetery Board, referred to in this Canon as "the Board".

- 2. Synod Council shall serve as the Board for any cemetery adjacent to or affiliated with a parish that has been disestablished, where such cemetery has not been conveyed to a third party.
- 3. The Board (save and except for a Board serving pursuant to section 2 of this Canon) shall be elected annually at the vestry meeting of any parish to which this Canon applies.
- 4. Should any parish to which this Canon applies fail to elect a Board, then the priest of such parish and the wardens of such parish shall serve as the Board.
- 5. Synod Council may approve policies and guidelines for the operation of cemeteries that are subject to the provisions of this Canon.
- 6. The Board shall administer the cemetery in accordance with provincial legislation pertaining to cemeteries, any regulations promulgated in accordance with said legislation, this Canon and any guidelines and policies approved by Synod Council concerning the operations of cemeteries.
- 7. In any conflict in interpretation between the provisions of this Canon, any policies and guidelines approved by Synod Council concerning the operations of cemeteries, and provincial legislation, the provisions of the legislation shall prevail.'

Amendment to Canon 4.7: Church Property

(20) No parish in the Diocese shall grant a right of way, an easement for utility or other purposes, enter a heritage designation agreement, establish a cemetery, scattering garden or columbarium, enter into a development agreement, apply for a demolition permit, or grant a restrictive covenant without consent of the Vestry by a two-thirds majority vote at a meeting called for that purpose, and approval by the Bishop and Synod.'

Synod Reconvenes Call to Order

The Bishop called the meeting back to order at 9:07 a.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Bishop announced that the church building of St. Luke's Palermo had successfully been moved yesterday during the time when we were meeting. In addition, Sue-Ann and Jeff Ward received the gift of a newborn granddaughter.

The Reverend Canon Marni Nancekivell made a number of announcements concerning the synod's move to Liuna Station for the anniversary celebration.

Gathering Rite & Prayer Stations

Similar to Friday, there were questions for reflection and different stations to visit during this time. Prayer was led by the Reverend Michael Deed.

General Synod Election Results

Canon Rob Welch announced the results of balloting. Elected as delegates from the order of clergy: The Reverend Martha Tatarnic, The Reverend Bill Mous, The Venerable Max Woolaver, The Very Reverend Peter Wall. And from the order of the laity: Susan Little, Patricia Davis, Andrew Clinkard, and Geoff Small.

In addition, Miss Siobhan Bennett, youth delegate, had been elected at youth synod earlier this spring.

2016 Diocesan Budget

Andrew Clinkard from the Budget Subcommittee of the Financial Advisory Board made the presentation; the theme was "Doing More Together".

TRC & Indigenous Self-Determination: Presentation & Discussion

The Reverend Canon Val Kerr and Ms. Donna Bomberry made a presentation including their personal backgrounds and their time at the "Lifted on the Wings of Faith" Indigenous Sacred Circle in August. The Primate and the Bishop also added their reflections on reconciliation and the calls to action from the TRC. The Bishop made an invitation for the formation of a group to meet to discuss how we as a diocese can respond to these calls to action. The presentation ended with the following quote by Justice Murray Smith. "When faced with a mountain, we have shown you the path to the top but we call upon you to do the climbing."

Bishop's Assent & Closing Remarks

The Bishop gave his assent to all of the proceedings of this session of the 141st session of the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:50 and delegates headed to Liuna Station for the 140th Anniversary Celebration and Primatial Address.

LIUNA STATION: We are More Together

At Liuna Station delegates were welcomed by "Bishop and Mrs. Fuller" and then joined guests from parishes. All were invited to look at and add to displays for each decade of the diocese in the foyer of the station; there were also pictures of all diocesan bishops on easels. In the main room there was live music, a liturgical dance interpretation of the Lord's Prayer. Information displays for the Niagara Anglican and the Anglican Journal were set up. Guests were instructed by the Reverend Canon Terry DeForest to arrange themselves in order of when their parishes were established and then their distance from Cathedral Place. After the Grace was said by the Bishop, guests enjoyed a buffet style lunch.

The Most Reverend Fred Hiltz, Canadian Primate, was introduced by Sister Margaret, CSC Sister Provincial. In his address, the Archbishop reflected on the history and ministry of the diocese in relation to the greater Church. Archbishop Hiltz presented Bishop Bird with a certificate commemorating the 140th anniversary. Dean Peter Wall then thanked the Primate for his comments and his time with us.

Each table was instructed to create a rope of fabric provided and then a collaborative fabric art installation was created in front of the podium. The Primate blessed our ministry and the suspended fabric art which represented how we are more together.

The Reverend Bill Mous spoke about the Refugee Sponsorship Initiative and the Reverend Scott McLeod asked delegates to respond with generosity, passion and prayer.

The Bishop thanked all of those on the event planning committee, the Synod staff, the Diocesan Archivist, the musicians, and each and every one present.

At 2:00pm The Reverend Deacon Jean Ruttan-Yates gave a final dismissal. Guests left with a copy of the new Diocesan map and the conviction that we are more together.

Procedure for Electing Synod Council Regional Representatives

- 1. Delegates to the diocesan synod will be asked to self-nominate as synod council regional representatives by indicating to their regional archdeacon their willingness to serve.
- 2. At a time or times designated in the agenda of synod, the members of the synod shall assemble in groups according to their regions. Members of synod not representing a parish shall be eligible to self-nominate and to vote with the regional assembly in which they are a member of a parish vestry. The Bishop, Dean, Chancellor, Secretary of Synod, Treasurer and diocesan directors shall not be eligible to vote.
- 3. The regional archdeacon, or in the absence of their archdeacon the Bishop's designate, shall chair the assembly corresponding to their region. Such person shall have the right to vote.
- 4. The chairperson shall appoint three scrutineers from among those who have not been nominated.
- 5. The members who have been nominated may be identified and may provide information to those assembled. The chairperson shall indicate how many representatives and alternates are to be selected.
- 6. Each member shall vote for his or her first choice among the nominees to serve on Synod Council.
- 7. The candidate receiving the greatest number of votes shall be deemed selected. In the event of a tie where two candidates may be selected, it shall be deemed that both have been selected; unless both candidates are from the order of clergy or only one representative is needed, in which case further votes between those so tied shall be taken. After three rounds of voting, if the tie remains the chairperson shall cast a second vote to decide the issue. The candidate receiving the second vote will be deemed selected; the other candidate may be deemed an alternate provided that position is available.
- 8. If the region has representation from the Order of Clergy, the second representative shall be selected from the Order of Laity. If the region has representation from the Order of Laity, the second representative shall be selected from either the Orders of Laity or Clergy.
- 9. The chairperson shall declare the business concluded when selections have been made to fill all vacancies from a region for the terms needing to be filled, such that there are two delegates and an alternate from each region, and report to the Secretary of Synod.
- 10. The Secretary of Synod shall report to the Synod the names of those who have been selected by their regional assembly for Synod Council by this process, and move the election of the nominees.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CANON 1.4

Election of Delegates to General and Provincial Synods

- 1. The prescribed number of clerical and lay delegates to General Synod shall be elected at the session of the Diocesan Synod held in the year preceding the year in which the General Synod is to be convened. (as amended, 1989)
- 2. The prescribed number of clerical and lay delegates to Provincial Synod shall, so far as it possible to do so, be elected at the session of the Diocesan Synod immediately preceding each meeting of the Provincial Synod. (as amended, 1989)
- 3. The clerical delegates shall be elected by the order of clergy at the Diocesan Synod and the lay delegates shall be elected by the order of laity, at the Diocesan Synod, provided that no person shall be eligible for election by an order unless that person is a member of such order and a member of the session of Diocesan Synod when the voting is held. (as amended, 1989)
- 4. Those of each order thus elected having the highest number of votes shall be the delegates to such Synods; and a similar number of those of each order whose names shall be next on the ballot, having the next highest number of votes, shall be substitute delegates to attend the said Synods whenever from sickness or other cause, any of the first elected delegates shall be unable to attend.
- 5. (1) A Nominations Committee for Provincial and General Synod delegates will be appointed by the Synod Council to solicit nominations from regional councils and to prepare the ballot for the Diocesan Synod. Regulations concerning the securing of names for the ballot will be determined by the Nominations Committee and approved by the Synod Council. (amended, 1995)
 - (2) Ballots presented to the Diocesan Synod for the elections of delegates to Provincial and General Synods for each order shall include an equal number of female and male nominees.
 - (23) Nothing in subsection (1) of this section shall be deemed to prohibit nominations from the floor of the Diocesan Synod, provided that any such nomination is moved and seconded and the nominee assents to being nominated.
 - (34) Members of the Diocesan Synod shall indicate a preference for the prescribed number of delegates to each of the General and Provincial Synods from those nominated pursuant to subsection (1) and (2) of this section, provided that no ballot shall be counted that does not contain at least one preference from each of the male and female genders.

 (new, 1989)
- 6. In publishing or printing the lists of the delegates to the General and Provincial Synods, the names of the clerical and lay shall be printed in the order of their election. (new, 1989)
- 7. No person shall be eligible for election to a General or Provincial Synod if that election would result in that person serving a fourth consecutive term as delegate at such Synod, provided that this section shall not be interpreted to have retroactive application to any delegate elected to any session of Provincial Synod prior to 1991 or to any delegate elected to any session of General Synod prior to 1992, and further provided that this section shall not apply to any person who holds office as Prolocutor or Deputy Prolocutor of either General Synod or Provincial Synod or Vice-Chancellor of General Synod.

 (new, 1989)

Rationale

Our diocese has long strived to draw the circle wider still and to be on the leading edge of inclusivity in the Canadian Church. The last changes to this canon, made over 20 years ago, sought to achieve this aspiration with regards to the inclusion of women in governance roles. Yet since that time much has changed with regards to our understanding of gender. Our societal understanding of gender identity has grown beyond a binary approach whereby a person would be considered either male or female. A person's gender identity may be as a woman, a man, both, neither, or anywhere along the gender spectrum. Diocesan programs now reflect this understanding by asking participants their preferred gender identity, where necessary, rather than asking them to check a male/female box. This amendment updates Canon 1.4 by providing an anti-oppressive approach to gender with regards to our provincial and general synod elections.

At the same time, gender diversity is but one of the many forms of diversity we may wish to be represented in our General and Provincial Synod delegations. In fact, the most recent provincial and general synod elections have demonstrated that more people identifying as female have been nominated, and that people identifying as male have then had to be recruited to run in order to comply with the gender balance provision of the canon. This is problematic, not the least of which is because the pool of candidates is diluted by those less than keen to serve, but being persuaded to do so for the sake of canonical compliance.

The need for diversity in our governance structures remains an important value for our diocese. It is incumbent upon the nominations committee, as mandated by Synod Council, to ensure that diverse representation is sought out as an essential part of diocesan nomination processes.

Housekeeping amendments also clean up language in sections 5(1) and 7.

The Secretary of Synod and diocesan Chancellor have been consulted on these proposed amendments.

Report of the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Church Buildings 2016

Mandate, Purpose and Key Responsibilities

Specifically; the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Church Buildings shall be appointed by the Bishop and shall continue at his pleasure

Likewise; the Committee shall, at the request of the Bishop, or at the request of a Parish through the Office of the Bishop, provide experienced, informed and impartial advice to parishes that have concerns about the condition, maintenance or preservation of their buildings; by assisting in a review of those concerns, in the identification of general problems, in the finding of competent consultants or contractors, and in the monitoring of any resulting work programme; all as may be necessary or requested, and report to the Bishop on all of this.

Also, to assist the Bishop by reviewing and commenting on the plans and drawings of any proposed new church buildings or major modification of an existing church building, and by reviewing, from time to time, the progress of any such construction: and undertake such other tasks as the Bishop may, from time to time, assign to the Committee.

A Concern

Key to delivery of this mandate is the way in which Canon 4.6** is acknowledged, adopted and respected by individual Parishes. Although every project with a value of \$15,000 or more falls within the purview of Canon 4.6, there have been examples of parishes either circumventing its requirements or of simply ignoring them.

The imperatives which underpin Canon 4.6 are transparency, economy and good governance. They depend on competitive comparisons and competitive prices for both design agreements and construction contracts.

In the past year we have become aware of Parishes in every corner of the Diocese that have proceeded without benefit of Canon 4.6, and we worry that potential savings may have been missed and that transparency may have been made opaque.

In this regard, the BACCB supports the Diocesan initiative to review the efficacy of Canon 4.6

(**Canon 4.6 is the diocesan ecclesial law that governs where and how permission must be sought and obtained to erect, alter, or add to a church-owned building. All church buildings and land are either the property of the diocese or are held in trust on behalf of the diocese.)

Nevertheless, in this same year, members of the BACCB have been invited to assist parishes in Cayuga (a major addition); Port Colborne (a settlement problem); Oakville (two rooves and a major renovation); Hamilton (two rooves, accessibility, and a ramp); Waterdown (a re-development); also Rockwood, Lowville, Winona, Fort Erie, Dunnville, Milton and Flamborough. Separately, members have provided on-going advice to major re-developments in Hamilton and Oakville.

The Committee is pleased to work in co-operation with both The Decennial Inspection Committee (DIC) and with the Financial Advisory Committee (FAC).

While we are all proud of our 19th and 20th century churches, making them energy efficient for the 21st century is an important, cost-effective, environmental initiative. Similarly, the issues of accessibility, safe-church needs and fire safety are all vital components of our Anglican mission; to improve the social environment of our property and buildings.

We have together inherited a great investment in the parish churches of this diocese, and it falls to all of us to maintain them in sensible recognition that the Spirit which created them is now working in new and different ways.

Report of the Bishop's Decennial Inspection Committee

The BDIC has the task of encouraging the parishes to schedule their decennial inspections when they come due. We also review the inspection documents when they are submitted to ensure that they meet the requirements of the terms of reference.

The committee assists parishes (when requested) in developing action plans for completion of critical items on the inspection report. We also conduct structural reviews of vacant diocesan buildings and provide advice on other unique building issues.

6 decennial inspections have been completed so far this year (4 of those were outstanding rom previous years). At present, 5 inspections are overdue, and 3 are on the schedule to be completed this year. 11 inspections are coming due in 2017.

It is the hope of the committee to become more of a resource to the parishes in working through the inspection process and in dealing with identified repair items.

Safe Church Report to Synod 2015-2016

In the past year, the Diocesan Safe Church Team has provided education, consultation support, and when necessary, an investigative team in a variety of settings. From parish churches to inter-diocesan situations, from youth events to Canterbury Hills education and consultation, the Safe Church Team has been present. We have had six "situational consultations" in the past year that have demanded in varying levels of involvement and response by the Team.

This past year, we invited Marion Little, formerly the Safe Church Coordinator of the Diocese of British Columbia to be the key note presenter at a Basic Safe Church Education Event. Marion's energy in her presentation was boundless. Present at that event were parish priests, deacons, musicians, lay workers and others.

In the past year, we also called together a configuration of three groups, to see us into the future of our Safe Church policy. One group is in the midst of re-writing policy, another group is interested in consultation, and yet another group is prepared to work in the area of education. The policy group is the first group to be deployed and is has reviewed Safe Church policies from around the globe, and is also looking at misconduct policies in other not for profit organizations as well as in industry. The Diocese of Niagara is intentionally broadening our volunteer base in this area, bringing together individuals of different ages, sexual orientations and backgrounds as we work together at discerning what it is to be a Safer Church. We are working with social workers, former government officials, lawyers, educators, corrections officials, lay people and clergy, all of whom bring a varied expertise in the area of misconduct and boundary violations.

We have invested in a resource from the Faith Trust Institute this year, entitled: <u>Teaching Healthy Boundaries 101 and 201.</u> We look forward to using this resource within the next year. Healthy Boundaries are about far more than Clergy Sexual Misconduct. "A perfect storm occurs when... vulnerabilities and systemic congregational anxiety interact, leading to burnout and boundary problems that hinder pastoral excellence". (<u>Saying No to say Yes)</u>, David C. Olsen and Nancy G. Devor, Rowman and Littlefield, 2015)

Whether we are clergy or church school teacher, deacons or working with newcomers, may we practise being a Safer Church, grounded in self-awareness, strong support systems and wise choices, for ourselves and for others.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN SYNOD COUNCIL

This report summarizes the actions of the Synod Council from November 2015 to October 4, 2016, the date of the most recent meeting. Seven meetings were convened with an average attendance of 71%.

Membership

Changes of membership were in accordance with Canon 1.9 for Diocesan Committees, Bishop's Appointees and Vision Groups.

- appointed Mr. William Connor as Assistant Administrator for the Parish of St. Barnabas, St. Catharines effective June 8, 2016 through October 15, 2016.

- authorized the renewal of the agreement between the Diocese of Niagara and Service Canada to maintain the registration of our Supplemental Unemployment Benefit (SUB) Plan for illness, training and temporary stoppage of work.
- approved an increase of not less than 1.5% to the minimum clergy stipend scale, in addition to the year of experience increases built into that scale, for 2017 (over the 2016 figures).
- directed that an increase of not less than 1.5% be applied to all housing allowances for 2017.
- recommended to parishes a 2.1% increase in 2017 over 2016 figures, [representing a 1.5% cost of living allowance increase and a 0.6% year of experience increment] to:
 - stipends of clergy and licensed lay workers who are receiving stipends in excess of the mandatory minimum; and
 - o salaries of all (non-licensed) lay employees.

Parish and Property Matters

- authorized the motion of the Vestry of Grace Church St. Catharines to demolish the burned dwelling at 7 Spruce St., St. Catharines, Ontario.
- granted permission to St. George's, Guelph to proceed with their capital project of \$1,200,000 to be covered by their endowment funds (with the intent this be repaid by their upcoming capital campaign).
- authorized the Corporation of the Parish of St. James and St. Brendan to enter into an agreement with Mr. John Marsh to purchase the property known as 25 Charlotte Street and 26-33 Charlotte Street on the parish's behalf from the seller for the purposes of creating much needed green space, beautifying our downtown, and (possibly) repurposing the vacant buildings for the benefit of the city.
- authorized the Diocesan Treasurer to approach the Canadian Bank of Imperial Commerce to arrange a mortgage of \$300,000 for St. John the Divine, Cayuga, for their property Accessibility Upgrade project
- approved the sale of the property located at 310 Geddes St., Elora
- endorsed the kitchen renovation project for St. Paul's Fort Erie and the proposed budget as
 presented, with funding coming primarily from the United Way and Salvation Army and remainder
 from the parish
- endorsed the proposed capital improvements for St. Mark's Church Niagara-on-the-Lake including: pointing; window and frame repairs; roof replacement and insulation; plaster repairs and interior painting; and improved interior lighting all to be completed in phases as the fundraising campaign allows. The estimated overall cost of the improvements approved at a Special Vestry is \$750,000.
- authorized the Corporation of St. James Dundas to withdraw \$25,000.00 from their Rectory Fund, held with the Diocese, to increase their existing \$25,000.00 Term Deposit at TD Canada Trust to \$50,000.00, to be used as collateral to increase their Line of Credit to \$50,000.00, with all interest earned returning to the Rectory Fund.
- supported the Corporation of St. Luke's Palermo with the application to the Anglican Foundation of Canada for a grant of \$30,000 over 3 years to cover part of the cost of a sign, furnishings, equipment, and program materials necessary to make the new St. Luke's Community Centre a functional, hospitable, and vibrant Anglican gathering space that will support the parish's outreach and evangelistic activities.
- supported the Corporation of St. Alban's Beamsville with the application to the Anglican Foundation of Canada for a grant of \$30,000 over 3 years to expand and continue the agricultural seasonal ministry in the Parish and the greater Lincoln area.

- endorsed the application of St. George's Guelph to the Anglican Foundation of Canada for a grant of \$15,000 towards the replacement of the heating distribution system, allowing the parish to sustain and enrich their facilities as a home for mission, ministry and worship.
- recognized and affirmed the faithful service and witness to God's love expressed by the peoples of St. James Merritton over the past 140 years; acknowledged with gratitude the creative ministries, the support of partners and missional work, the sacrificial giving, and the spirit of fellowship that has marked the community of St. James; lauded the leadership of the Reverend Pam Guyatt and the courage and integrity of the wardens and parishioners as they have walked this difficult path of discernment; and grieved with the parish the loss of the building but celebrates with them the continuation of the fullness of their ministry as they prepare to move to Church of the Transfiguration, St. Catharines, to share their deep commitment to God's mission

Financial Matters

- received and tabled the FAC Report regarding Parish debt
- approved up to \$45,000 from the internally restricted Walking on Water (WOW) fund be made available in 2016 for grants.
- approved the 2015 audited financial statements of the Anglican Church Ministries, Niagara, Foundation.
- recommended the proposed change to the DMM Calculation be brought to Synod; and expressed its sincere gratitude to the members of the committee for their hard work.

Canons

commended the proposed change to Canon 1.4 to Synod, having duly considered it.

Other

- grateful for the ministry of our Bishop, commended him for his leadership in the Canadian church, and offered both its thanks and its strong support for the statement which he issued following the statement (Feb. 29) by the Analican Church of Canada's House of Bishops.
- recognized and gave thanks for the care and leadership that had been offered to the Diocese and the Parish of St. Barnabas, St. Catharines under the administration of the Reverend Will Alakas, Diocesan Administrator and Mr. William Connor, Assistant Administrator.

FAC Report to Synod

Over the past year the Financial Advisory Committee has spent a great deal of time reviewing Building and or maintenance projects that exceed \$15,000.00 in accordance with Canon 4.6. The purpose of this work is to assist parishes in exploring all possible forms of financing for the project, as well as offering due diligence to assure that they are not taking on debt that they will struggle with in the future or that will diminish the ability of the parish to continue doing ministry in the community in which they are located.

A sub-committee continued to explore a new formula that would make the DM&M less difficult to calculate and reduce the need for follow up questions after parishes submit their vestry reports. We are confident that this new formula will simplify the process and not greatly change the cost to parishes. Educational meetings were offered across the Diocese to explain this new formula prior to synod so that all would understand the changes.

A report was presented to Synod Council advising that Accounts Receivable from parishes had grown to the point that they totaled 50% of the year's Diocesan budget. Bishop Bird met with FAC and shared his thoughts on this subject and the Committee is now studying ways that we can help parishes that are behind in the submission of both DM&M assessments as well as payroll which has been paid on their behalf from Diocesan funds. There are many issues that still need to be addressed and therefore this is still in the study stage and likely will take some time to resolve.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE/BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEE

The Finance/Budget Subcommittee (FBSC) is responsible to the Financial Advisory Committee (FAC), and assists the Treasurer with the preparation of the Diocesan budget, and in conjunction with the FAC, monitors Diocesan financial operations, including parish loans, loan guarantees and debt repayment plans. FBSC in 2016 consisted of three laity and two clergy, the majority of whom also serve on FAC. This year FBSC has met formally one time with the Bishop, and informally in smaller groupings on several occasions. The Treasurer and the Budget Chair have also met on a number of occasions to refine the numbers.

To get the proposed budget to this stage has proven challenging; for more than five years, revenue has remained unchanged, while the demands on the expense side have increased, in part due to inflation, but also reflecting increased needs that have outpaced the rate of inflation.

The budget process began early in 2016, building on the projected budget for 2017 seen at last year's Synod, taking into account the budget requests received from numerous stakeholders including Diocesan staff, and factoring in current year actuals. Difficult decisions then had to be made with respect to some discretionary line item spending (accounting for only 10% of the budget) to assist in bringing the budget closer to break even. Several investment funds (including Survive and Thrive) were in a position to have surplus monies that could be utilized for their intended purposes of growing Diocesan ministries, providing some much needed revenue. Continuing as we have in recent past years, some of our ministries are fully funded by generous individual donors. The resulting proposed budget received both the Bishop's approval, and more recently Synod Council's at their October meeting.

In preparation for the budget presentation at this fall's Synod, two well attended regional pre – synod meetings were held in mid October with the objective of communicating the proposed budget to interested parties prior to Synod. The presentations were PowerPoint based with a one page condensed budget for attendees. The presentation was not line item focused, but rather expenses were grouped into thematic categories with general trends and themes discussed. The proposed budget was well received at both pre-synod meetings.

The enclosed line item eight page budget includes the proposed budget for 2017, and a forecasted budget for 2018 to provide some "forward guidance" to Diocesan staff and to the Diocese at large. Only the proposed 2017 budget will be voted on at Synod.

The financial state of the Diocese, although healthy from the standpoint of the balance sheet, and from the proposed surplus on a cash flow basis in 2017 of \$40,706, is facing increased financial stress as it strives to keep its budget balanced. We are confident

however, the proposed budget for 2017 is money well-spent enabling Niagara Anglicans to do more together than we could on our own.

I wish to thank Bishop Michael for his advice and input in the budget process, and for the competence of the Finance Department under the leadership Diocesan Treasurer Jody Beck, and for the dedication and abilities of each FBSC member, and the ongoing support of FAC.

Report of the Insurance / Risk Management Subcommittee

The Insurance / Risk Management Subcommittee functions as a Subcommittee of the Diocese of Niagara's Financial Advisory Committee. Its purpose is to provide advice on matters pertaining to the Synod's Insurance Program and Risk Management related concerns. The Subcommittee is tasked with carrying out an annual review of the Synod's policies with the broker's assistance and to report its findings to the Finance Committee.

Our insurance Broker is Jones Brown Inc. (formerly Pearson Dunn). The insurance carrier for the Diocese continues to be the ECCLESIASTICAL INSURANCE OFFICE PLC. The Subcommittee has remained with Jones Brown and ECCLESIASTICAL as we believe that they both have a proven track record in insuring the needs of faith based communities.

Following are the highlights of our claims history.

Property / Liability claims paid out: \$400,102 / \$0 for the year ending Jan 31, 2016. Property / Liability claims paid out: \$1,433,031 / \$37,473 for the 5 years ending Jan 31, 2016.

The Loss ratio for the year ending Jan 31 2016 was 51%. The Loss ratio for the 5 years ending Jan 31 2016 was 37%. As a result the Diocese did not qualify for the Profit Sharing (return of premiums) for the year ending Jan 31 2016. We are hoping losses will be less in the coming year allowing the Diocese to be eligible for this discount again in the coming year. This discount is passed on to parishes on a prorated basis if their insurance is paid in full in the year.

Policy changes for the 2016-2017 policy year:

Premium rates per \$100 of insured values have remained the same in the new policy year. However, since property values used have not been increased for the general pool of properties for 3 years, and the cost of materials and labour used to repair or rebuild properties has gone up in the last few years, it has been decided that property values, for properties that have not been appraised in the past 3 years will have a 3% inflation factor added to their values for the 2017/2018 premium year.

Functional Replacement Cost (FRC) has been discussed with Ecclesiastical over the past few years. We are planning to test this method of determining replacement costs and therefore premiums in the fall of 2016.

Deductibles have not increased for the new policy year; however coverage values have increased for Crime related claims from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

User Group Insurance Program

This program is ongoing and being actively used by the parishes in the Diocese. Rates and application forms can be found online.

The Subcommittee continues to work to ensure coverage meets our Diocese and parish needs and is cost effective.

REPORT OF THE INVESTMENT SUBCOMMITTEE

On behalf of Synod Council of the Diocese of Niagara, the Investment Sub-Committee monitors the investment funds of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara and the Anglican Church Ministries Foundation (ACMF), Niagara Investment Fund. The Investment policy can be found on the Diocese website.

A system of participation units is employed (a system similar to individually purchasing units in a mutual fund). Monies that the Diocese or parishes invest are used to purchase participation units. Originally valued at \$10 per unit, participation units at August 2016 were worth \$25.33 The Investment Funds totalled \$36,065,598 as of August 31, 2016. These funds are made up of funds deposited by the ACMF, the Synod, Parishes and other associated organizations. The Investment Funds are invested by Russell Investments, the Investment Manager since 2002.

The year to date return as at August 31 2016 is 6.385.

The fund is invested in a diversified portfolio of fixed income and equity investments managed by Russell. The breakdown as agreed with the Investment Committee is:

The value of the investment portfolio at Dec 31 2015 was \$35,011,920 and total investment income for the year ending Dec 31 2015 was \$1,597,182.

At the request of our Bishop and executive committee we spent more than a year investigating the quality and reliance of our investment manager Russell and the suitability of our asset mix. Russell Investments' outsourced investment advisory approach utilizes their multi-manager funds to deliver their best investment ideas for the Diocese. Russell integrates advice, investment management, custodial services and performance evaluation into a comprehensive fee structure.

Russell has established a multi-faceted approach to develop its Responsible Investment (RI) capabilities ensuring that it discharges its UNPRI commitments by:

- An energetic contribution to external RI initiatives,
- Integrating ESG into our core manager research processes,
- Investment in data and proxy voting service providers,
- Pan-regional consulting research on governance,
- An increasingly active role as responsible owner.

These efforts will continue to be refined over time. It is our belief that they will generate enduring benefits for all of our stakeholders.

Current members of the Investment Sub-Committee are. Andrew Bucknall, Reverend Canon Robert Fead, Derek Wood, Steve Fricker, and Fred Roach. The Committee receives information and support from Ms. Joanna Beck, Diocesan Treasurer and Kim Waltmann, Administrator of Investments.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

The committee includes 6 independent volunteers, 4 being professional accountants and 2 who understand financial statements.

Our committee monitors the integrity of the audited annual financial statements of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara that they are complete and understandable and fairly present the financial position, cash flow and results of its operations.

We met in June this year with the Treasurer and the external auditors (KPMG) to review the draft 2015 financial statements and auditors' report. Based on that review some minor revisions were made and then we approved the audited 2015 financial statements for issue to the Bishop and the members of Synod. The Treasurer and her staff and the auditors were thanked for their commendable performance.

This year members of the audit committee conducted an internal audit of the accounting records and procedures for Parish Rectory and Discretionary Funds as of September 30, 2015. The total market value of these funds at that date was \$25.1 million. Our report was issued to the Bishop and Treasurer of the Diocese and to KPMG.

Members of our committee will be meeting this fall with the Treasurers of parishes in our Diocese who have asked for help in understanding how to account for and report on their parish funds.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Bishop and the Members of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at December 31, 2015, the consolidated statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on our judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, we consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

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Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the year ended December 31, 2015, current assets as at December 31, 2015 and net assets as at January 1, 2015 and December 31, 2015.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara as at December 31, 2015, and its consolidated results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2015

The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara (the "Diocese") is a Christian community of faith that geographically encompasses the area of the Niagara Peninsula, Greater Hamilton, the Region of Halton and portions of Wellington and Dufferin Counties, and which includes approximately 90 Anglican parishes (congregations). The governance of the Diocese is done through The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara which was incorporated by an act of the Provincial Government of Ontario, assented to on February 10, 1876 and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. The Synod is comprised of the Bishop, clergy and designated representatives from each parish. The Bishop is the Chief Officer of the Diocese and, as such, provides oversight for the clergy and parishes who comprise the Diocese.

1. Significant accounting policies:

(a) Basis of presentation:

These financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit entities in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook. These financial statements do not include the operations nor the assets and liabilities of the individual parishes.

From time to time, the Diocese assumes the management of the Church properties from parishes or congregations (former parish properties). This can occur when a church is closed; when a parish or congregation is disestablished or amalgamated with another parish or congregation; or, when the Diocesan Council deems such action necessary. If church properties are disposed of, the Diocese is responsible for any such resulting gain or loss.

These statements include the operations of Canterbury Hills. Canterbury Hills operates a summer camp during the summer months and provides conference services during the remainder of the year. The Camp and Conference Centre are located on Diocesan land and administrative and financial services are provided to Canterbury Hills by the Diocese.

(b) Fund accounting:

The Diocese follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

The General Fund reports revenues and expenses related to program delivery and administrative activities. All investment income is recorded in the General Fund.

The Restricted Funds report resources contributed for which the use is restricted by the donors or management.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Year ended December 31, 2015

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(c) Revenue recognition:

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(d) Capital assets:

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Repairs and maintenance costs are charged to expense. Betterments which extend the estimated life of an asset are capitalized. When a capital asset no longer contributes to the Diocese's ability to provide services, its carrying amount is written down to its residual value.

Land and buildings (churches, rectories, etc.), which are under the administration of the parishes, are not included in these financial statements.

Capital assets are amortized over the estimated useful lives of the assets on the straight-line basis at the following rates:

(e) Intangible assets:

Intangible assets are comprised of website design costs and computer software and are initially recognized and measured at cost. Development activities are recognized as an asset provided they meet the capitalization criteria, which include the Diocese's ability to demonstrate: technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale; the Diocese's intention to complete the asset for use or for sale; the Diocese's ability to use or sell the asset; the adequacy of the Diocese's resources to complete the development; the Diocese's ability to measure reliably the expenditures during the development; and the Diocese's ability to demonstrate that the asset will generate future economic benefits. The assets are amortized over their useful lives unless the life is determined to be indefinite. Amortization of the website design costs is being recorded over a period of two years. The carrying value of an intangible asset which is subject to amortization is tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when the carrying amount is not recoverable and exceeds its fair value. Impairment losses are not subsequently reversed.

(f) Supplemental insurance benefits:

The Diocese provides its active members and retirees with a life insurance benefit of \$10,000 for active members and \$8,000 for retirees. The Diocese maintains funds within their investments to fund the obligation. These funds are held by the Diocese and not as a segregated trust. As a result, these funds and the related investment income are not included in the actuarial valuation and subsequent extrapolations. Active clergy employees contribute at a rate of \$6.67 and lay staff contribute at a rate of \$2.50 to the fund per employee per pay cycle.

The Diocese accrues its obligation using the accrued benefit method. The measurement date of the obligation coincides with the year end of the Diocese. The most recent full actuarial valuation was December 31, 2012.

Actuarial gains (losses) on the accrued benefit obligation arise from differences between actual and expected experience and from changes in the actuarial assumptions used to determine the accrued benefit obligation. The accrued benefit obligation and current service costs for these plans are recognized using the accrued benefit method pro-rated on service, and income is charged with the cost of the benefits in the years in which the employees render the service which gives them the right to receive such benefits. Remeasurement and other items are recognized as a direct increase (decrease) in net assets and are not reclassified to the statement of operations in subsequent periods.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Year ended December 31, 2015

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(g) Contributed services:

Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in these financial statements.

(h) Financial instruments:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Diocese has not elected to carry any such financial instruments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Diocese determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Diocese expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

(i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the carrying amounts due from parishes, loans receivables, long-term receivables and obligations related to supplemental insurance benefits. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Restricted cash:

Restricted cash consists of funds received on behalf of parishes and funds received for the direct benevolent work of the Bishop.

Included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities for the prior year is the balance of restricted cash that was received late in the year for a parish and was subsequently distributed in 2015.

4. Loans receivable:

Loans receivable are comprised as follows:

(a) Employees:

Loans receivable from employees totalling \$2,566 (2014 - \$9,416) represent funds advanced to clergy and other employees at the Diocese. The loans are for terms not exceeding 48 months. Interest is charged at the quarterly prescribed rate as set by Canada Revenue Agency.

(b) Church extension:

Church extension loans totalling \$786,365 (2014 - \$644,371) represent funds loaned to parishes for land, buildings and additions. The Diocese has borrowed money that has been re-loaned to the parishes to finance these church extension projects.

12. Supplemental insurance benefits:

Current employees are entitled to \$10,000 if actively employed at the time of death and retirees are entitled to \$8,000 upon death. If a current employee leaves the Diocese before retirement their benefit is forfeited.

The Diocese measures its benefit obligation for accounting purposes based on the most recent actuarial valuation at December 31, 2015.

16. Parish funds:

From time to time, parishes deposit funds through the Diocese for investment purposes. The funds are not reflected in the financial statements of the Diocese. The capital and income earned thereon remain the property of the contributing parish. At December 31, 2015, the fair market value of the parish, Diocese, and Anglican Church Ministries Foundation funds invested through the Diocese amounted to \$35,011,924 (2014 - \$30,366,500).

17. Financial instruments:

(a) Currency risk:

The Diocese is exposed to financial risks as a result of exchange rate fluctuations and the volatility of these rates. In the normal course of business, the Diocese purchases investments denominated in foreign currencies. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2014.

(b) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Diocese will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Diocese manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Diocese prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2014.

(c) Credit risk:

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty may default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss. The Diocese is exposed to credit risk with respect to the amounts due from parishes, loans receivable, and long-term receivables. The Diocese assesses, on a continuous basis, these balances and provides for any amounts that are not collectible in the allowance for doubtful accounts. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2014.

(d) Interest rate risk:

The Diocese's long-term debt has a variable interest rate based on prime. As a result, the Diocese is exposed to interest rate risk due to fluctuations in the prime rate. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2014.

(e) Market risk:

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of market factors. Market factors include three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and equity risk.

The Diocese' investment activities involve investments in mutual funds which are monitored by an investment committee as well as management. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2014.

18. Related party transactions:

The Diocese is affiliated with the Anglican Church Ministries Foundation (the "Foundation") by virtue of their joint control by the Synod Council. The Foundation was established to raise funds for the use of the Diocese and its Bishop in their mission work. The Foundation is incorporated by an act of the Provincial Government of Ontario, assented to on January 1, 1999 and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. At December 31, 2015, the Foundation held net assets in the amount of approximately \$17.9 million (2014 - \$17.4 million), the benefit of which will accrue to the Diocese and some of its affiliates in the future.

Investment administration fees of \$20,000 (2014 - \$15,000) were charged by the Diocese to the Foundation and have been included in Administrative fees and rental income on the Statement of Operations.

19. Contingencies:

The Diocese issues letters of guarantee through its financial institution to provide guarantees to certain parishes. Outstanding letters of guarantee amount to \$ 247,977 (2014 - \$247,977).

20. Comparative amounts:

The financial statements have been reclassified, where applicable, to conform to the presentation used in the current year. The changes do not affect prior year's earnings.

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Human Resources for Ministry Committee Report to Synod

The Human Resources for Ministry Committee advises the Bishop and Synod Council with respect to policy and best practices pertaining to a wide range of human resources matters referred to them. In doing so, we strive to uphold our diocesan vision and promote vision-consistent values.

In 2016 we:

- Welcomed the Venerable Peter Scott and Ms. Ann Cunningham to our ranks;
- Consulted about and undertook an extensive revision and update of the Cathedral Place Staff Employment Manual;
- Recommended to the Bishop the renewal and extension of our diocese's agreement with Service Canada (Employment Insurance) concerning a Supplemental Unemployment Benefit [SUB] plan, allowing us to provide shortterm sick leave benefits for up to 119 days;
- Monitored the development of a comprehensive "customer service standards" policy, summary of scope and feedback forms and mandatory training for Cathedral Place staff and volunteers as required by the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (2005) [AODA] and as consistent with our values of justice and hospitality;
- Recommended to Synod Council a mandatory cost of living increase to the minimum stipend scale and all housing allowances;
- Recommended to Synod Council annual cost of living and year of experience increases for:
 - those clergy and licensed lay-workers receiving compensation in excess of minimum stipends; and,
 - o all (non-licensed) lay employees.

We look forward to completing the Cathedral Place Staff Employment Manual and continuing to reflect on policies with respect to compensation, and such other issues as may arise in the coming year.

Once again, the Committee is indebted to the ongoing support of the Reverend Canon Terry DeForest, Vision Advocate and Director of Human Resources, in partnership with other diocesan staff, attending to this area of diocesan life.

The Anglican Church Ministries Foundation, Niagara is an incorporated entity whose objects are as follows:

To receive and maintain a fund or funds and to apply all or part of the principal and income therefrom, from time to time, for charitable purposes, and in particular to assist The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara, in the Anglican Church of Canada, its Bishop and Archbishop:

- (i) to preach, promote and advance the spiritual teaching of the Christian family, and
- (ii) to support and maintain churches and the mission of the Church in order to propagate and express the Christian faith.

Accordingly the Foundation maintains and monitors investments in a number of endowed funds, including:

Education and Training for Leadership in the Church Fund

The Bishop's Company Fund

Synod Endowment Fund

McMaster Campus Ministries Endowment Fund

In addition the Foundation holds endowed funds for a number of parishes, as well Rectory funds for a number of parishes.

The Foundation held investments of \$17,916,863 at December 31, 2015 (2014 \$17,443.849) as shown on the financial statements included in the Synod Circular documents.

The Foundation is committed to continuing to protect and grow the funds in its mandate.

More and more people are doing family histories today and use the Church Archives for checking and verifying names, relationships, dates and places. Much of my work as Diocesan Archivist is checking parish registers for Baptism, Confirmation, Marriages and Burials. A nominal fee is charged for a certified copy of any registration.

It would be very helpful for someone in the parish to be the Parish Archivist. Parish Secretaries are often too busy with parish work to spend time searching parish registers. If there is such a person in your parish please send me their name, address and phone number so I can contact them if need be.

Clergy should make sure every space is filled in and all documents are properly signed. Please print name first then sign. It's almost impossible to decipher some signatures today.

It's very sad that penmanship is being dropped from the public school curriculum.

Please remember to check all current Registers and when filled up take them to my attention to the Cathedral, with 4 copies of the contents of marked boxes. I then catalogue them and take them to Mills Memorial Library at McMaster University to be digitized and this also sent to the parish for their researching. There is no charge to a parish for this Diocesan service.

I have a record of every item from a parish at McMaster. Please contact me if you want a copy. Also our brochure titled "Archives – our story" tells a parish quite clearly what is archival and what is not. Canon 2.6 is all about Archives.

Greening Niagara Committee 2016 Synod Report

Caring for creation is an important part of who we are as a faith community.

Greening Niagara has now completed its 8th year; bi-monthly meetings held at the Cathedral. New members are welcome.

2016 Highlights of our ministry:

Sustainability Grants and Green Audit program – This is the 3rd and final year for parishes to have applied for a Green Audit and a follow up Sustainable Capital Improvement Grant. This year 4 parishes have completed a Green Audit and 3 parishes have received sustainable capital improvement grants. This brings the total, since 2013, to 11 parishes having done a green audit and 9 having applied for a sustainability grant.

2016 Green Parish Awards: the parishes of Holy Trinity, Hamilton; St. Paul's, Glanford; St. Andrew's, Grimsby; and St. George's, Lowville; achieved their Bronze Accreditation this year and St. James, Dundas their Gold. Congratulations to these 5 parishes

Green Parish Accreditation Program: to date 46 bronze, 17 silver and 4 gold accreditations have been achieved by our parishes.

Green Facilitators: Nearly 60 parishes now have a Green Facilitator (GF) appointed.

Living Our Vision for Ministry

The Bishop and diocesan staff are hearing vision-shaped good news stories all over the Diocese as they travel to meet with parishioners and parish staff. There are new ministry partnerships emerging in Guelph and St. Catharines; refugee families settling into communities across the diocese; recently appointed Archdeacons with responsibility for Truth, Reconciliation & Indigenous Ministry, and Ministry Leadership Development who are already engaging us in new opportunities; innovative WOW projects; Conflict Management workshops; repayment of long-term debt, new community partners, grants to support community ministry, and the stories go on...

In the midst of these stories of grace, hope and transformation, the vision groups are meeting less regularly as the vision becomes embedded in our DNA. Nevertheless, opportunities for learning and innovation continue to emerge as we pursue each aspect of our diocesan vision amongst vision groups members and the wider diocesan community.

Journeys in Faith

Journeys in Faith undertakes to recommend books to the Bishop to consider for his annual Lent book and were pleased that the Diocese was invited to read *In God's Hands* by Archbishop Desmond Tutu during Lent 2016. Reflections and questions were provided for parish study groups and for individual use. The JiF group has been working with Life Changing Worship on a revamp of the Bishop's Diploma Course and that work is ongoing.

Life Changing Worship

The Diocese of Niagara co-sponsored the National Anglican Lutheran Worship Conference held July 24-27, 2016 at Wilfrid Laurier University and ten Niagara liturgy leaders participated (many with LCW bursaries). In addition, members of the group are working hand in hand with member of JiF to reimagine the Bishop's Diploma Course, an ongoing process. New liturgy and music resources have been added to the diocesan library from which parishes are welcome to borrow at any time.

Continuous Culture of Innovation

The successful annual Re-church conference continues to be the focus for this group, and by the time you read this, the 2016 conference "Healthy Leaders Deepening Mission; Applying Spiritual Principles of Leadership" with guest speaker, Kevin Martin, author of Five Keys for Church Leaders, will have just concluded. This follows on Kevin's powerful 2015 Re-Church offering which focused on Healthy Communities and Building the Mission Team. Details can be found at www.rechurchnow.com

Generous Culture of Stewardship

Much of this work is being handled by the Stewardship, Legacy Giving and Fund Development Consultant, Lisa Di Veto, who has been assiduously meeting with parish leadership teams to discern more effective ways of preserving and increasing financial assets. Lisa also offers regular grant workshops which have been very effective in leveraging parish engagement resulting in successful grant applications. For example, with assistance from Lisa several parishes and affiliates were successful in receiving Canada Summer Jobs grants. Lisa is also developing legacy documents, in memoriam brochures, and a Best Practices workshop around annual giving.

Outstanding Leadership for Ministry

In May 2016, Bishop Bird appointed the Venerable Dr. Steve Hopkins as Archdeacon for Ministry Leadership Development to support him and other diocesan leaders in equipping clergy and lay leaders to nurture disciples and grow missional communities in accordance with our diocesan vision. Overall, Steve hopes to foster curiosity about leadership and enhance access to resources for learning. Initiatives to date include a preliminary conversation and questionnaire at the June 2016 Clergy and Layworkers' Conference, launching "Diving Deeper: the Niagara Internship in Reflective Pastoral Practice" (with Dr. Lori Edey and Terry DeForest), creating a Missional Leadership Learning Circle composed of clergy supporting each other to develop a new style of parish leadership, preparing to launch a Facebook group called "Niagara Leadership Community" where clergy and lay leaders can share ideas and resources, and initial planning for a diocesan leadership conference in 2017. Prophetic Social Justice Making

The first-of-its-kind international Justice Camp created an opportunity for 50 participants to live more deeply into our ongoing ministry relationship with the Diocese of Cuba, while at the same time explore God's work of justice-making through a unique cross-cultural experience.

People, parishes and community groups have responded in all sorts of incredible and unexpected ways to the global refugee crisis and our 140th anniversary initiative. Since the beginning of this year, groups have sponsored over 110 refugees – more than the diocese has in the past decade combined; and already 78 people have been welcomed into the communities we serve.

Bishop Michael's bold and pastoral response to ensure members of the LGBTQ2 community have equal access to the sacrament of marriage has not only sought to

uphold the dignity of every human being but has served as a prophetic witness to the Church about God's radical inclusion.

Archdeacon Val Kerr's appointment was a powerful statement of our commitment to truth and reconciliation in the Diocese of Niagara and already her ministry is bringing people together for teaching, building relationships, and fostering healing and reconciliation between indigenous and non-indigenous peoples.

Report of the Niagara Anglican

2015 marked the 60th anniversary of the Niagara Anglican.

We featured the past six decades with a special anniversary edition in October, 2015. To mark the milestone we also reprinted from past editions, reflected on the changing church and sponsored a booth celebrating the 140th Synod of the Diocese of Niagara.

Our mission statements, adopted over the years, never waver from our vision ...

1955 – To inform and inspire:

2005 – News, perspective, reflection for a growing church;

2015 – A gathering place and sounding board.

Since 1955 the paper has been at the forefront of our communications media. In it we have shared each other's stories, reflected on differing ideas, attitudes or issues and through it all remained committed to the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The paper is strong because of the ownership felt by our contributors, who supply the paper with news and articles about their parishes, groups, diocese or special interests. For example, we asked people to report on their Prayer Shawl Ministry, hoping for three or four reports. We were overjoyed when over 15 parishes reported on the marvellous work and impact of this ministry in the lives of people.

Spending Lent with Mark – lay people and clergy contributed commentaries on daily readings to enrich the spirituality of individuals and groups who followed Mark through Lent 2015. Several other diocesan papers reprinted our meditations, and some parishes outside Niagara Diocese used them for their weekly Bible study.

Our advertising is stronger than ever and the annual appeal which we partner with the national paper – Anglican Journal - continues to increase, thanks to the commitment and generosity of our dedicated readers. (Details are in the audited statements).

Being online ensures the option for those who wish to read the paper digitally, while retaining our print presence for those who want the hard copy of the Niagara Anglican.

The future of all print media relies mainly on the quality of the products produced and the needs being fulfilled. It is a two way avenue. The Niagara Anglican and its "owners" have made it a busy thoroughfare, and hopefully this will continue in the years ahead.

Report of the Partners in Mission (PIM) Committee to Niagara Synod 2016

Several exciting developments and events have happened with our Companion Diocese Relationship with Cuba since our last Diocesan Synod.

Bermejas: In January the rebuilt Church in Bermejas was re-consecrated. St. George's Guelph had raised most of the money for the rebuilding and two of St. George's parishioners: Alayna and Shastyn Griffin were able to fly down and attend the consecration.

<u>World Day of Prayer:</u> This year the International World Day of Prayer focused on Cuba. The entire liturgy reflected the Church in Cuba. Because of a request for speakers for World Day of Prayer Services, the PIM committee developed a Video resource for use within the diocese.

<u>Justice Camp:</u> Much work was done especially in Niagara by Bill Mous and Christyn Perkons (along with Anglican Church of Canada, PWRDF and Cuban Planning team members) in preparation for the International Justice Camp held in Cuba April 30th to May 7th. The camp brought together 25 Canadians and 25 Cubans. Immersion experiences included Economic Justice, Food Security and Social Engagement. There is much to learn about the experience on the website iusticecamp.ca

<u>Visit by Archdeacon Andreis and Marcela:</u> On May 15th Dean Cormack was priested and we were delighted to see both the Ven. Andreis Diaz Dorta and his wife, Marcela who journeyed from Cuba to attend the ordination. Dean had spent time with them in Cuba. Also Andreis and Marcela were both very involved in the recent Justice Camp in Cuba.

<u>At General Synod</u>: (July 7th to 12th) Cuban Bishop Griselda Delgado del Carpio,, husband, Gerardo, Dr. Pepe Bringas and his wife Olga were present as observers and presenters. On the Friday they made an hour-long presentation to the whole of General Synod. On the Monday, they hosted a lunch forum with Q&A. Stuart Pike acted as the translator for both events, as well as for the group during most of the rest of General Synod.

<u>Water Project:</u> Following General Synod a meeting with the four Cubans, members of PIM and John Page (a Justice Camp Participant) put together the start of an exciting new major project in Cuba: Bringing water purification systems into Parishes that need them. These systems in rural Cuba supply fresh water not only for parishioners, but for the entire village, greatly improving the health of the whole community. Watch for ways that your parish will be able to be involved in making a difference in this way.

<u>PIM "Celebrating Mission Day":</u> PIM will be organizing a day in early 2017 where parishes can "show and tell" about the ways they are involved in mission partnerships so we can learn from and encourage each other.

THE CATHEDRAL PLACE PROPERTY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This committee oversees the annual budget for Cathedral Place, does long range planning for maintenance and major repair items and is present to assist and give advice to the Property Manager.

The challenge continues to be able to deal with the growing list of priorities identified by the Property Manager, while staying within the allocated funds in the diocesan budget. There have, however, been a number of minor upgrades/repairs to the property, as well as one major expenditure, that required the oversight of Canon 4.6

After conferring with a member of the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Church Buildings and a member of the Finance Advisory Committee, permission was given to proceed with the replacement of the roof on the Cathedral. The successful contractor chosen from the bids collected was Robertson Restoration. This expenditure, along with others such as plumbing work, electrical work, and sound system upgrades, have utilized most of the funding available for same.

With the approval in principle at last Synod to the Cathedral Place Revitalization Project, this committee was updated periodically on where the project was as far as progress. We still hope to have representation in the planning for same when that moves forward.

We welcomed a few new members to the committee over the past year, and I would like to thank all the members for their time and contribution to the life of Cathedral Place.

7) Attawapiskat Solidarity

WHEREAS: Attawapiskat, population 2,000, is in the midst of a suicide epidemic. More than 100 people, children and adults, have attempted to take their lives since last fall — 28 March 2016 alone.

AND WHEREAS: A group of youth, desperate to turn things around, walked for three days onto a winter road to convince their peers that suicide is not a solution and vowed to hatch a plan to heal the community. They walked in the tradition of other First Nations walkers who have travelled long distances to raise awareness and return to a healthier lifestyle.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. Youth Synod Council explores ways in which the youth in our diocese can come alongside youth of Attawapiskat beyond the current crisis and respond to needs identified by the youth of this community.
- 2. As part of this exploration, Youth Synod Council explores whether there is interest from youth to build relationships with the youth of Attawapiskat by regularly writing letter to the youth.

9) Missing & Murdered Aboriginal Women

WHEREAS: According to the National Women's Association of Canada, 10% of homicides against women are against Aboriginal women while they make up only 3% of the female population;

AND WHEREAS: A study from the RCMP showed that between 1980 and 2012, over 1017 Aboriginal women and girls were murdered (this is 4.5 times greater than any other Canadian homicide rate);

AND WHEREAS: The same study also showed that in November 2013 at least 105 First Nations, Metis and Inuit women and girls were reported missing.

- Posters and pamphlets are great resources, but the best way to grow our programs and to share what
 happens in them is by word of mouth, and that means delegates sharing with friends and classmates
 and fellow parishioners. Staff can promote but so can delegates.
- Debate on Religious Freedom barely scratched the surface and is worth more conversation. Learn
 rights as Canadian citizens, about Charter of Rights and Freedoms, which gives fundamental freedom
 of thought and religion though oppressions are faced by people living here and around the world.
- What does it mean for you to uphold the dignity of every human being, and to live with love in your everyday choices?
- In 1993 the Anglican Church of Canada apologized for its 33 residential schools across Canada. No residential school in our Diocese but plenty nearby, and still lots of work to do to reconcile our past with our future. As a starting point, visiting the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada website www.trc.ca will provide lots of information.
- Justice making is about relationship. Letters without relationship may not be effective must witness oppression wherever it happens but also explore ways to build relationships and find ways to enter into a dialogue with our brothers and sisters in Jamaica.
- Thank you for your work throughout this weekend for the motions, the debate, the perspective, the discernment. It has been thoughtful, moving and meaningful.
